DIRECTOR'S REPORT 2006-08

IGS is an Organized Research Unit with a complex mission. In addition, to developing and administering research projects with a primary emphasis on governance in the United States and elsewhere, the unit is charged with providing research and internship opportunities for students, and for conducting public affairs programs and providing reports to the general public and state government. The past two years have witnessed a large number of new efforts and departures in these domains.

Research and Events. In terms of organized research IGS has focused on expanding its scope in both an interdisciplinary and comparative direction. A large grant from the EU awarded to Professor David Vogel and Ms. Heddy Riss deals with the regulation of environmental and health-related issues in California, the United States, and Europe. This project involves scholars from many science and social science disciplines at Berkeley and the University of Leuven in Belgium. One workshop has already been held and a visit to the campus from the EU Ambassador to the United States to sign an MOU on this topic has been offshoot of this research initiative. In addition, Mr. Ian Clark was awarded one of ten fellowships under the 2008 EU Fellowships Program, which funds stays at select universities in the U.S., Europe and Asia for EU officials focusing on Transatlantic relations.

A Berkeley Futures Grant to IGS now has generated several new research proposals, including one for a national survey of Asian Americans, under review at both the Russell Sage Foundation and the MacArthur Foundation. A small grant from the UC Humanities Institute to study the balance between ethnic and political diversity in California has just been awarded in collaboration with UC San Diego.

Internally, IGS has created the following two new Centers for affiliated faculty:

- Center for the Study of Representation, directed by Terri Bimes of Political Science. Among its faculty affiliates are Sarah Song of JSP and Ann Joseph of the Law School.
- Center on Immigration, Race, and Ethnicity, directed by Taeku Lee, Professor of Political Science.

In addition, David Hollinger, Professor of History, is the new incoming director of an American Political History Colloquium which will get under way in early fall 08. This very popular seminar brings together scholars from several departments to share new research on the topic of American political history through the lens of biography.

A major year-long program at IGS in 2007-08 was a series of events called "Choosing the Presidency: Campaigning and Governing in War and Peace." This program was comprised of a set of policy symposia dealing with economics, health policy, energy, environmental policies, foreign policy in the Middle East, the war on terror, immigration, and education. This project was a collaborative outreach activity with IGS as the lead participant and co-sponsored with the following campus partners: the School of Law, Haas School of Business, School of Public Health, College of Natural Resources, Graduate School of Journalism, and the Graduate School of Education. Participants were drawn from a large number of departments both on and off campus, with programs webcasted and made available on UC-TV. In addition, IGS and the Law School co-sponsored a conference on the presidential nominations process. This day-long program, held on April 10-11, 2008, attracted more than 100 audience members and the contributing papers will be published next year in an edited volume.

Other notable activities of a public nature were book events for new books on globalization by the head of the Lee Kuan Yew Institute in Singapore, a volume entitled: *Public Opinion and Constitutional Controversy*, edited by Persily, Citrin, and Egan, with most chapters written by Graduate Fellows at IGS, and a book *Understanding America*, edited by Peter Schuck and James Q. Wilson, with chapters by Nelson Polsby and Jack Citrin.

Finally, IGS received a grant from the James Irvine Foundation to host a conference called *Proposition 13 at 30* on June 6, 2008. By all estimates, this was an enormously well-attended and successful event and an edited volume of the individual presentations will be published this fall.

The above account indicates the mix and range of activities related to research and public policy undertaken by IGS in 2007-08. These efforts noticeably broadened the interdisciplinary character of programs and participation and set the groundwork for future growth in this domain.

In addition to these new programs, IGS continued the activities of its core seminars on Positive Political Theory, American Politics, and Race, Ethnicity, and Immigration. Each of these seminars invites to campus distinguished scholars from other universities, giving both faculty and graduate students here exposure to new work.

Student Programs. Two years ago, IGS proposed the creation of the Robert Matsui Center of Politics as the home of a variety of activities to encourage student engagement in public service. Chancellor Birgeneau approved taking this step and the 2007-08 federal budget included funding both for archiving of the late Congressman's papers and for endowing the Matsui Center at IGS. When the funds are received IGS will initiate a program that includes financial aid for student interns in Washington, Sacramento, and local government, as well as for a Robert Matsui Visiting Fellowship at IGS, and a Matsui Forum. The Matsui program will supplement the Cal-in-Sacramento summer program that continues to thrive. Finally, IGS is negotiating with PG&E to

create an additional undergraduate internship program centering on environment policy and performance, with particular attention to the Latino community in the state.

IGS obtained a generous donation from William Brandt, Jr. to create research fellowships for both graduate and undergraduate students. The Mike Synar Graduate Fellowship in American Politics and Policy is intended to assist PhD students with costs associated with collecting and analyzing data for their theses. Five fellowships of \$3,000 each were awarded to students from four departments: Sociology, History, Agricultural Economics, and Political Science. IGS also inaugurated the Nelson Polsby Undergraduate Research Award to assist students working on honors theses. Nine awards of \$500 each were granted in January 2008.

Wilma Chan served as the Legislator-in-Residence during 2007-08. Ms. Chan taught PS 110B, a joint class offered by IGS and the Travers Political Science Department, that prepares 25 undergraduate students to enter summer internships in Sacramento.

Taken together, these activities represent a further broadening of access to IGS and its resources and to some extent they also represent a return on the ongoing effort at fundraising and development.

Future Plans. Several of the projects cited above are preparatory for upcoming research proposals and public events. Professor Schickler has proposed a major project to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation; this would be run at IGS. Similarly, Citrin has proposed to the EU another research project on immigrant integration. IGS also is participating as a member of a consortium conducting an internet-based survey of the 2008 election. The Choosing the President series culminates with a second conference: *The Presidency at War*, again co-sponsored with the Law School promises to be a major event this fall.

Space limitations constrain the ability of IGS to be the physical home of our numerous affiliated faculty. Renovation and upgrading of facilities has occurred and now five faculty share space at IGS and have become more of a presence in both intellectual and administrative activities. I look forward to continuing the process of both broadening and intensifying faculty and student participation in the Institute.

**STATEMENT FROM THE CHAIR OF THE
IGS FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE - LAURA STOKER**

The Institute of Governmental Studies (IGS) is an intellectually broad, vibrant, and flourishing institution. The following remarks comment specifically on the Institute's "contribution to UC Berkeley's research enterprise."

IGS inspires and sustains interdisciplinary research and encourages collaboration and communication across disciplines. IGS Research Centers—including the Center for Globalization and Information Technology, the Center on Institutions and Governance, the Center on Immigration, Race, and Ethnicity, and the Center for the Study of Representation—are all explicitly interdisciplinary in focus. IGS Colloquia series (e.g., "Immigration, Race, and Ethnicity," "Institutions and Positive Political Theory," "Politics and History," and "Law, Business, and Politics") regularly bring together students and faculty from diverse niches on campus. In its efforts to build interdisciplinary research communities, IGS actively coordinates and works synergistically with other ORUs and research centers on campus. IGS has also built partnerships with departments and schools within the university. For example, the John Jacobs Fellowship Program is co-sponsored by the Graduate School of Journalism and the California Supreme Court Oral History Project is co-sponsored by the Boalt School of Law. In all these ways, IGS helps to create active and engaged communities of scholars joined by common research interests.

IGS supports research and educational activities on politics and government that traverse methodological approaches and field boundaries and are responsive to the diverse interests and agendas of faculty and students. That means that the research agenda is always evolving. Still, the Institute has an ongoing commitment to furthering research on California politics and of developing effective exchanges between UC researchers and Sacramento lawmakers. Examples include the California Statewide Database developed and maintained by IGS, IGS-sponsored research published in the "California Politics and Government" series of the IGS press, the most recent of which is *The New Political Geography of California*, and symposia and lectures focusing on California politics, which over the past year include "Mental Health Law Symposium: Protecting and Treating those Destabilized by Mental Illness," "Proposition 13 at 30," "Big Daddy: Jesse Unruh and the Art of Power Politics," and "California and the European Union: An Emerging Partnership."

A second, ongoing aspect of the IGS research agenda is focused on elections, voting, and public policy issues in the United States and California. The IGS "Choosing the President" series of panels, symposia, and conferences this year brought together scholars, elected officials, and political professionals to address public policy issues facing the nation (e.g., healthcare, Iraq war), challenges of governing (e.g., the President and the courts), and the 2008 Presidential election (e.g., Choosing the President in 2008: The Evolving Process and its Effects). IGS regularly sponsors panels on California ballot propositions and election-night events that bring together students, faculty, journalists,

and community members. In recent years IGS-supported research has led to volumes on political parties, electoral redistricting, and the California Open Primary, among other topics.

The Institute's research-related activities involve students as well as faculty. IGS provides important opportunities for undergraduate students to gain experience working in and with politics as well as to carry out research on politics and government. It sponsors the Cal in Sacramento Platinum Fellowships, the John Gardner Fellowship, the John Jacobs Fellowship, and the Nelson W. Polsby Grant for Public Affairs Research. Numerous undergraduates serve as research assistants at IGS Centers and on research projects that are run through IGS. IGS also encourages undergraduates to attend IGS-sponsored lectures, symposia, election-day events, and conferences.

IGS's role in graduate students' professional development is even more fundamental. Many graduate students work as research assistants for IGS projects or for IGS-affiliated faculty. IGS seminars provide opportunities for students to present their research and get early feedback. The IGS colloquia and other events also bring graduate students and faculty together outside of the classroom, providing opportunities for informal learning and exchange. IGS is always trying to foster graduate student research, whether it be through faculty-student collaborations and through graduate research projects like those collected in the recently published edited monograph: *Public Opinion and Constitutional Controversy* (Oxford University Press, 2008).

The IGS Faculty Advisory Committee met twice in 2007-08 with the Director and Assistant Director of IGS to review its programs. The Committee is satisfied that the Institute is fulfilling its mission to the campus and encouraged with continued progress in leading interdisciplinary scholarship and in supporting students.

IGS PUBLICATIONS

IGS Publications has enjoyed an especially productive biennium, reorienting our book publishing program while continuing to produce new titles.

We have reoriented the publishing program to increase our focus on books that pose less financial risk to IGS. We are now largely producing books that either have pre-production commitments for course adoption (such as *The New Political Geography of California*), or that come to us with advance funding to cover our costs (such as the Bagley memoir). The revenue generated from these projects should rebuild the financial base of the publications program, which was seriously depleted to pay for a large part of the library renovation, and should allow us to publish occasional books which have little financial benefit but which are directly related to the IGS mission.

We have also increased the frequency of the *Public Affairs Report* while continuing to strengthen its content and design.

The publications program has also played a key role in other IGS projects, such as the redesigned marketing materials and improved publicity materials for IGS conferences and other events.

Book Publishing

We have produced 10 new titles thus far in 07-08, with one more title currently at the printer, and a variety of other projects in various stages of early production.

2008 Titles:

- *Racial and Ethnic Politics in California: Continuity and Change, volume III*, Sandra Bass and Bruce Cain, eds. Forthcoming, fall 2008. This collection of essays, which is now completed and at the printer, should have strong potential for course adoption.

- *The New Political Geography of California*, Frederick Douzet, Thad Kousser and Ken Miller, eds. A collection of essays on the new political demography of California, including topics such as the east-west divide, residential segregation, religious division, redistricting, race, direct democracy, and case studies of specific metropolitan areas or regions. Published with assurances of course adoption by the contributors.

- *Risking House and Home: Disasters, Cities, Public Policy*, John M. Quigley and Larry A. Rosenthal, eds. A collection of essays based on papers delivered at a conference on natural disasters cosponsored by IGS and others. The Program on Housing and Urban Policy provided funding to cover IGS costs.

- *America After Iraq: A New World Order or No Order?*, by Mark Steyn. This is the latest edition of the series based on the Nimitz Lectures in National Security Affairs. Costs covered by the Military Affairs Department.

2007 Titles:

- *California Votes: The 2006 Governor's Race*, Ethan Rarick, ed. This is the traditional volume developed from the quadrennial IGS governor's campaign conference. As always, this volume generated significant interest among California political journalists, legislative staff members, and scholars.

- *The California Political Almanac: 2007-08*, A.G. Block and Jerry Lubenow, eds. This new edition of the Almanac was published in conjunction with CQ Press. Also published online.

- *Voting Rights Act Reauthorization of 2006: Perspectives on Democracy, Participation, and Power*, Ana Henderson, ed. An edited volume of essays that grew out of a conference hosted by Boalt Hall.

- *The Political Question Doctrine and the Supreme Court of the United States*, Nada Mourtada-Sabbah and Bruce Cain, eds. This collection of essays was published in conjunction with Lexington Books, a division of Rowman & Littlefield.

- *To Be the Change You Wish to See: A History of the California Legislative Fellowship Programs*, by Elizabeth Barham Austin. A history of the California Legislative Fellows Program, which was developed at IGS and is now based at the Center for California Studies at Sacramento State. The Center was the co-publisher of the book.

- *War, Ancient and Modern: What the Conflicts of the Past Teach Us about the Fighting of Today*, by Victor Davis Hanson. This was part of the series of books based on the Nimitz Lectures in National Security Affairs. Costs covered by the Military Affairs Department.

- *Nelson W. Polsby, 1934-2007*. A memorial volume devoted to the life and work of the former IGS director.

Other Projects

The Publications program also increased the scheduled frequency of the PAR to four times a year, and continued to refine the new design of the publication. We also made a strong effort in the past year to improve the design quality of IGS marketing and publicity materials. Most notably in this regard, we designed new marketing materials, which have yet to be finalized. We also attempted to improve the design of programs, posters, and flyers for IGS conferences and other events. An outstanding example of this is the program for the IGS spring 2008 conference, "Choosing the President: The Evolving Process and Its Effects." This color program incorporated the overall series logo and mirrored the design of posters, flyers and other materials for the conference. We plan to continue similar design efforts to better brand IGS events in the future, particularly those that are part of an ongoing series.

Last, our series of IGS Working Papers, which are published online through the eScholarship Repository, continued to draw a substantial readership. IGS Working Papers were downloaded more than 40,000 times in 2007-08 thus far. The success of the Working Papers series represents a substantial online outreach effort from IGS to its constituency groups in both the academy and the general public.
